


AND 34 - FILING 15




LEGEND

Rob,

Since those trees were not part of the original Tree Protection Plan, you will not be required to mitigate them or to change/amend the Landscape Plan to accommodate their relocation. You are allowed to relocate them to another area of your property with no issues related to the Black Forest Ordinance. Likely the trees were too small at the time the initial inventory was conducted.

Just to reiterate something we talked about on the phone earlier...aftercare is extremely important when you move a tree. No sense moving it, if you don't have a good watering plan for the tree. You should make sure that the trees are staked (take the staking material off approximately one year after moving the trees), and make sure they are well watered. You should water approximately 10 gals. Per diameter inch three days per week. For example, if the tree is 8" in diameter, then you should be prepared to water it 80 gals three days per week. This should be done in the first year, particularly in the growing season. It would really only need to be done in the winter a couple times a month if there wasn't good snow cover.

It usually takes about one year for every diameter inch of a transplanted tree to recover. So an 8" diameter tree will take about 8 years to fully recover from transplanting and begin really growing again.


